

The ECODETER Chair: Greening, Democratization and Territorialization of Industries in a Comparative Perspective

Launched in February 2025, the 'Greening, Democratization and Territorialization of Industries in a Comparative Perspective' (ECODETER) junior professor chair examines the contrasted emergence of 'green developmental States' through a comparative approach focused on Colombia, France, Indonesia and Uganda.

The ecological transition has become a new reference framework for public policies in many European, North American and South American countries, leading to shifts in how environment and economy are linked. Major or incremental, such shifts raise a series of questions which are addressed by the ECODETER junior professor chair and its research programme, 'Regulation and greening of global value chains' (RECOVAL).
